

WHAT HAPPENED AT CIRCUIT MEETING?

The Circuit Review: 'Forward in Hope' is ongoing and a document compiled by the Circuit Leadership Team, which has already been circulated to all churches, was received and accepted by the Circuit Meeting.

The next step is for all churches to hold an **open meeting** as an opportunity for all those involved in the life of the churches to have their say and ask questions. These meetings will be attended by members of the Circuit Leadership Team.

The meeting looked at a first draft of next year's Circuit budget. Inflation increases mean that we need to raise £340,000 from the assessments paid by the churches of the circuit, £60,000 more than last year. Our hope is that church finances have now recovered sufficiently from COVID that we can meet this amount. The Circuit Meeting did agree to support certain activities related to mission from circuit reserves for this year.

A spreadsheet analysing current church assessments, set against varying criteria. – attendance, giving, surplus – is available to aid discussion. It is only intended as a discussion document as churches consider their assessments for next year. Ideas on how to improve this document, including more accurate data, are welcomed.

Our ministers are our biggest asset and therefore deserve our full financial commitment. The Circuit cannot continue at current funding levels, since Circuit reserves have absorbed stipend increases in recent years. The Circuit is all our churches, and we are asked that each church prayerfully consider it's giving.

THE WORLD CHURCH GROUP

The World Church Group (previously Circuit Mission Group) has in the last six years comprised of seven people representing the following churches in the Circuit: St Andrew's, Conway Road, Radyr, Cathays and Llandaff North Methodist Churches. Two people have stepped down from the group in the last fortnight. The viability for this group has been questioned as there has been a lack of support from Circuit Churches.

This long running group has held Prayer Breakfasts vide zoom, supported one church in South Africa with 'The men at the roadside appeal 2022' and held two joint Circuit Mission Services (once with missionaries who have returned home from South Africa and another with our Circuit Minister who has retired to Capetown, South Africa). Contribution to the group is sadly lacking. It has left the group constantly asking how this group can reach out to Circuit Churches to get excited and engage with the group? What world church connections, mission partners and is/are 'live, across the world in each of our local churches? Can we share stories to celebrate?



No one is beyond the reach of God's love. Jesus' life, death and resurrection opened the door for everyone. We can all find the way to forgiveness, hope and peace.

"All may be saved to the uttermost"

There are no limitations on what God can do in the life of God's followers. God's Spirit can work huge changes in us and through us.

Members of **St Andrew's** were joined by some folks from St Thomas', the Church in Wales in our locality, to sing carols at the Birchgrove pub just before Christmas to raise money for Action for Children.

It was a great community event as we sang for about an hour spreading Christmas cheer.



Each Friday in Lent, **Wesley Caerphilly** hosts a lunch with the proceeds going to Christian Aid. A different denomination volunteers to take responsibility for making and serving soup each week.

This year we revived a feature originally introduced by Rev. Alana Lawrence where a guest speaker is invited to give a 10 minute talk on a topic of interest following the "meal". Our own Dave Kitchen set the ball rolling on the first Friday, when Wesley was in charge, talking about his book "Bible in 10". On 8th March our local MP and shadow minister for the Middle East and North Africa, Wayne David, shared his thoughts about the current situation in Israel and Palestine and the need for compromise and collaborative working. Other contributors are our local clergy including Rev. Evelyn Bhajan.

It's good to be able to join forces in sharing the work, having a time of fellowship together, comparing the merits of "Hairy Bikers" and Delia Smith" soup recipes and hopefully will raise around £1,000 for a good cause.

The **Boys Brigade** have also been busy - renewing their connection with a school in South Africa.

The 1st Caerphilly boys Brigade and Girls Association have also successfully steered 3 girls to obtain their Bronze award and Presidents Badge and 1 boy to get his Silver award with 2 other boys who are away at university and should finish theirs this summer.
